# Wednesday Bible Study - October 29, 2014 "After the Rapture - What?" - (Revelation 4:1-7)

Read Revelation 4:1-7. (Listen to Sermon Audio)

Where We've Been in the Book of Revelation so far:

- ➤ Chapter 1 Celebrity-ship of the Lord Jesus Christ
- Chapters 2-3 Characteristics of the Church Age
- First three chapters are an emphasis of the Church Age on earth, with chapters 2 and 3 addressing the seven churches of Asia Minor.

Chapters 4 and 5 emphasize the Church in Heaven; thus tonight's message title: After the Rapture – What?

### **OUTLINE**

- I. We must remember that the book of Revelation is the unveiling of the person of Jesus Christ.
- II. It is a sermon preached to John on the Island of Patmos around 96AD (A one-man congregation).
- III. John is presented in Chapter 4 on a Sunday morning, worshiping. Jesus Christ comes on the scene, and John fainted; he was revived, and then instructed.
- IV. The sermon begins in Chapter 2 and ends with chapter 22. What a sermon from the Lord Jesus Christ!
- V. This wonderful book gives us a dispensational picture:
  - 1. Chapter 1 Introduction
  - 2. Chapters 2 and 3 The Church on Earth (Church Age)
  - 3. Chapters 4 & 5 The Church in Heaven, after the rapture
  - 4. Chapters 6 & 19 Tribulation
  - 5. Chapter 20 Millennium
  - 6. Chapter 21 Eternal State, and Conclusion

John was worshipping, and a door to the heavens opened up, and John fainted. He began to see the difference between *sinlessness* and *sinfulness*. Revelation 1:17 shows us that John experienced fear, terror, and fainted (the scripture says "as a dead man".

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#### THE CHURCH IN HEAVEN - Revelation 4, 5

What will it be like after the Rapture? We get a tiny glimpse – we see GRACE before JUDGMENT. He always allows an opportunity to change before discipline.

### OUTLINE OF CHAPTERS 4 & 5 (What did John see?)

- 1. Throne of God 4:1-3
- 2. Twenty four Elders 4:4,5
- 3. Living Creatures 4:6-11
- 4. Seven Seals 5:1-4
- 5. Christ: Lion of the Tribe of Judah and the Lamb which slain 5:5-10
- 6. Myriads of Heavenly Angels join the song of Praise and Redemption 5:11, 12 (emphasis is *not* on the notes of music, but the *words*, the *content of the message*.
- 7. Universal Worship of the Savior and Sovereign of the Universe 5:13-14

Note some brief exegesis in Revelation 4:1.

META TAUTE (μετα ταυτε) – After this

EIDON KAI IDOU (ειδον και ιδου) – *I looked, and behold* (took a *long* look)

We have here a change in the panorama, not chronology; this is a vision of Heaven and not of Earth, as in chapters 1-3. The first vision was of Christ, and the message to the seven churches; the new vision is of the Throne of Heaven.

The word opening Chapter 4 is a particle formed from the aorist active imperative of *HORAO* – a *long look*. It means "focus your attention, and pay close attention to what is being said." A door opened, and John was able to see into heaven. Every person born into God's kingdom will be a part of the body being completed on earth until the time of the rapture. Then this body becomes *the Bride*, prepared in heaven, including the removal of earthly things and the old sinful nature. The door of Revelation 3:8 is the door of service; the door of Revelation 4:1 is the door of Heaven. The door presented in Revelation 19 is the door of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Advent of our Lord Jesus Christ.

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Look now at Revelation 4:2; John saw a throne, and on it, the one visible Member of the Godhead, the Lord Jesus Christ. Isaiah 6:1 is a prophecy that is the same vision: "I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, lofty and exalted, with the train of His robe filling the temple." The throne is mentioned in every chapter of this book, except chapters 3, 8, and 9, so it must be important. This throne stands for the Members of the Godhead; the Father, Son and Holy Spirit (Deities 1, 2 and 3), who share all the same 10 characteristics. God is the King of the universe, as revealed throughout the book of Matthew; In Revelation 5:5 He is presented as the "...Lion from the Tribe of Judah, the Root of David...", and is also alluded to in Revelation 4:7

He is presented as the Servant in the Gospel of Mark; In Luke, He is presented as the *Son of Man*, and so revealed in Revelation 4:7, where the word "Ox'' is used (or "Calf''), then the *Son of Man*. In the Gospel of John He is presented as the Son of God, and in Revelation 4:7, the description "*Flying Eagle''* is used.

#### REVELATION - John's Peek into Heaven

After the Church is in Heaven (Rev.4:1-5:14) He sees 7 things:

- I. He saw, first, the members of the Godhead, represented by the one visible Member of the Trinity Jesus Christ (Revelation 4:2, 3).
- II. Then He saw the 24 elders (ruling angels with victors' crowns; this means *reward* crown (στεφανοσ) *PRESBUTEROS* (πρεσβυτέρος <u>Revelation 4:4</u>)
- III. Thirdly, He saw the two signs of Judgment (<u>Revelation 4:5</u>) Nature gives a warning of the coming storm and (Revelation 4:5b) the 7 seven lamps of fire revealing that this is light before darkness GRACE before judgment.
- IV. Fourthly, John sees the Church at REST (<u>Revelation 4:6</u>) pictured by the "sea of glass like unto crystal"; The sea on earth can be, and often is, turbulent, unpleasant, and stormy! Heaven is neither stormy, unpleasant or turbulent.
- V. The fifth thing John saw were the four Living Creatures (<u>Revelation 4:6b-11</u>) = Angelic, brilliant, a combination of cherubs and seraphs A seraph is a reflector-type angel; a Cherub is a glamorous type angel, meaning the Person of Christ is a *glory reflector*.
  - 1. Jesus Christ is the Lion of the tribe of Judah Jesus the KING in Matthew.
  - 2. Jesus Christ is the calf (ox) MOSCHOS μόσχος = fattened calf SERVANT in Mark.
  - 3. "face of a man" Luke presents Christ as the SON OF MAN.
  - 4. The fourth *glory reflection* is the Flying Eagle, depicting Jesus Christ as *DEITY* as per *SON OF GOD* in John's Gospel.

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- VI. John Sees a Library in Heaven Revelation 5:1-4
  - > Study: 3 categories of Books Book of Life; Book of Works; Book of Judgment (presented as seals Chapter 6 judgments of the Tribulation).
- VII. John Sees Christ as Judge (<u>Revelation 5:5-14</u>) vs.5-Judge presented; verse 6 Person of the Judge; in verse 7 Work of the Judge; now John gets some REST (Revelation 5:8-14).

The life of Jesus Christ is presented in the Bible throughout the Harmony of the Gospels; in the following points we focus on the Book of Matthew:

- 1. Matthew presents Jesus as a king. He does not relate the birth of Christ, since a king does not have a lowly birth.
- 2. Rather, Matthew traces Jesus royal descent back to Abraham and David, through Solomon.
- 3. He is presented as the *Lion of the Tribe of Judah*, the promised ruler of Israel (in <u>Revelation 5:5</u>); the Book of Matthew clearly affirms this Kingship throughout.
- 4. He has a king's name *Immanuel* (Matthew 1:23).
- 5. He has a king's position (governor, or ruler Matthew 2:6).
- 6. He has a king's announcement (make straight His paths Matthew 3:2, 3).
- 7. He has a king's coronation (*This is My beloved Son, in Whom I am well pleased* Matthew 3:17).
- 8. He has due respect (You shall worship the Lord God and serve Him only Matthew 4:10).
- 9. He has a king's proclamation (He was teaching them as One having authority Matthew 7:29).
- 10. He has a king's loyalty ("He who is not with Me is against Me..." Matthew 12:30).
- 11. He has a king's enemies (He would suffer many things Matthew 16:21).
- 12. He has a king's love (giving His life, a ransom for many Matthew 20:28).
- 13. He has a king's glory (Matthew 25:31-34).
- 14. He has a king's sacrifice (Matthew 27:35-37).
- 15. He has a king's victory (Matthew 28:6).
- 16. Matthew tells of the royalty of the wise men coming to see Jesus (Matthew 2:1-6).
